All classes open unless otherwise stated

The Society's District comprises the Parishes of Christow, Ashton, Bridford, Doddiscombsleigh, Dunsford, Trusham, Hennock, Chudleigh Knighton, Teign Village, Longdown, Dunchideock, Tedburn St. Mary and Cheriton Bishop.

The Hall will be cleared of all persons not officially engaged promptly at 10.30 a.m.

All cups and trophies are perpetual unless otherwise stated and must be returned to Clare Cook The Lodge, Canonteign, Christow, Nr Exeter by 13th August 2011 or after this date to Rendells Offices at Newton Abbot or Exeter.

No exhibits may be removed before 4.30 p.m. but all MUST be removed by 5.00p.m.

Counting of points shall be as follows: First Place - 4 points, Second Place - 2 points, Third Place - 1 point, Reserve - 1/2 point.

Not more than two entries per Exhibitor allowed in each Class.

W.I. Section Exhibits: The space available to each exhibitor shall be 4'3" x 4'3". The exhibits shall be roped off. Institutes will be allowed to set-up from 2 p.m. the day prior to the Show. Two chairs will be provided for each exhibit.

The Judge's decision is final.

Any complaint by an exhibitor must be made to the Secretary in writing between 3.30pm and 4pm on Show Day, when a Complaints Committee will be present to deal with it. A deposit of £5 must be paid which will be returned if the objection is upheld.

The Committee's decision on any disputed point shall be final.

The Committee reserve the right to inspect the Garden Allotment and Exhibit of any Exhibitor on or before Show Day.

The Committee will not be responsible for any injuries, damage or losses of any kind, however sustained.

## HINTS TO EXHIBITORS

### VEGETABLES

- Potatoes** Medium size, matching for shape, shallow eyes, clear skin.
- Onions** Good size and colour, well ripened skins. Bulbs should be sound round the neck. Tops should be dressed and roots removed. Fold top over and tie. Place on cardboard or plastic rings.
- Shallots** Pickling. Well ripened. Should pass through a 30mm riddle  
Culinary. Well ripened. Of uniform shape and size. Dress as for onions. Shown on sand in a plate or dish.
- Garlic** Clean off all soil fragments, dry completely. Reduce the dried stem to about 1" (25mm). Stage bulbs as complete specimens; do not divide segments.
- Cabbage** Firm heads, uniform size, should be shown with 50 mm (2") stalk.
- Beetroot** Medium size, shapely, good colour when cut. Wash and trim off small roots. Should be shown with 100 mm (4") of stalk and no leaves.
- Carrots** soak and sponge clean. Shapely and of uniform size. Should be shown with 100 mm (4") of stalk, no leaves.
- Tomatoes** Firm and of good colour, even in size. Should be shown with calyx attached. Place on a plate with Calyx uppermost.
- Runner beans** Should be crisp, straight and of even size. Should be shown with a piece of stalk attached.
- Leeks** Of uniform size and length. Should be shown with 25 mm (1") of root attached, top dressed and tied with raffia.

### FRUIT

- Apples** Should be of average size for variety. Of good colour.
- Stoned fruit** Should be of average size for variety. Of good colour. Place on plate or dish.

### FLOWERS

At all times the quality of bloom must be the first and chief consideration and we will override mere size with your cut.

With flower exhibits you should aim for neatness and uniformity and to ensure freshness cut your material the evening before the show and leave them overnight in a cool place up to their necks in water. Special care must be taken of the quantity in the class you are showing in.

### COOKERY AND PRESERVES

Jam, Curd or Marmalade Jars should be covered correctly with waxed disc and cellophane cover. Fruit should be evenly distributed throughout. The jars must be 454/354 gm (1lb or 12 oz in size)

### GENERAL NOTES

- (1) All exhibits, personal property, etc. will be at the risk of the exhibitors, and the Society will not be liable for compensation or loss or damage from any cause whatsoever.

#### ON THE MORNING OF THE SHOW

- (2) Go to the administration desk immediately to collect your show cards.
- (3) Give yourself ample time for staging
- (4) Check that you have staged the specified quality in each class and that your exhibits are all in their right class.

5 x 62.5g mars bars, cut into slices

2 tbsp. double cream

225g (8oz) cornflakes

You will need a tin 30 x 23 cm/12 x 9in greased .

**Method:** Pour the milk into a non-stick saucepan to cover the base.

Add half the mars bar slices and stir over a low heat until melted. Add the remaining

mars bar slices and the cream and stir again until melted. Add the cornflakes and stir until all the flakes are coated. Spoon into the prepared tin and level the top. Transfer to the fridge to set. Cut into 18 pieces.

100g (4oz) baking margarine, from the fridge

100g (4oz) caster sugar

100g (4oz) self raising flour

1 tsp baking powder

2 eggs

6 tsp lemon curd

You will need a 12 hole bun tin lined with paper cases.

**Method:** Measure all the ingredients except the lemon curd into a bowl and beat until combined and smooth. Spoon evenly into paper cases. Bake in a preheated oven (180 degrees C /350 degreesF /160 degreesC fan/ Gas 4) for about 15 mins until well risen and golden brown. Set aside to cool. Once cold, cut out a shallow cone shape vertically from the centre of each cake. Fill each hole with half a teaspoon of lemon curd and return each cone on top of the lemon curd at a slight angle. Dust with icing sugar.

#### Ingredients (makes 14)

175g (6oz) self raising flour

75g (3oz) porridge oats

175g (6oz) granulated sugar

1 tsp bicarbonate of soda

1 tsp baking powder

175g (6oz) butter

2 level tbsp. golden syrup

You will need two baking sheets, greased.

**Method:** Measure the flour, oats, sugar, bicarbonate of soda and baking powder into a mixing bowl. Measure the butter and golden syrup and heat gently, stirring until the butter has melted and combined with the syrup. Pour into the mixing bowl with the dry ingredients and stir until combined. Turn out of the bowl onto a work surface and divide into 14 pieces and then shape into dough balls each about 2 cm (1") in diameter. Arrange on the baking sheets, not too close to each other as they spread to at least double their

size. Press the tops to flatten a little. Bake in a preheated oven (180 degrees C-350 degrees F-160 degrees fan/Gas 4) for 12-15 mins until golden brown. Leave to cool on the baking sheet.

#### Ingredients:

125g (5oz) butter or margarine

125g (5oz) sugar

2 eggs

175g (6oz) self raising flour

Few drops vanilla essence

45ml (3 tbsp) milk

4 tinned pineapple rings

A few hazelnuts, chopped

**Method:** Butter the base of an 18 cm (7in) cake tin or oven proof dish. Arrange a design of pineapple rings and hazelnuts on the bottom of the dish. Cream together the butter and sugar until light and soft. Whisk the eggs well and beat gradually into the butter mixture. Sieve the flour and mix the vanilla essence and milk. Fold the flour and milk alternately into the creamed mixture. Spoon the sponge mixture onto the pineapple. Bake in a preheated oven (170-180 degrees C/325 –350 degrees F) for about 1 hour.

**Ingredients:**

450g (1lb) strong white flour

2x5ml teasp salt

1x5ml teasp mustard powder

175g (6oz) hard cheddar cheese grated

1x5ml teasp active dried yeast

300ml (half pint) warm water

25g (1oz) chopped walnuts

2 x 450g (1lb) loaf tins greased

Oven 190 degreesC/375degreesF/Gas 5

**Method:** mix flour, salt, mustard and walnuts in a bowl together and mix in grated cheese (reserving a little to sprinkle on top of loaves.) Mix yeast with 1 cup of warm water to reconstitute and pour into bowl with flour. Add the remainder of the warm water and work to form a dough that leaves the side of the bowl clean. Knead for 10 mins and put aside to rise in a warm place covered with a tea towel. When doubled in size remove from bowl and knock back and knead again briefly. Divide into two equal sized pieces and put into greased tins. Put to rise again until dough reaches the top of the tins and sprinkle with the remaining cheese. Bake in a pre heated oven for 45 mins until golden brown and the loaf sounds hollow when tapped taking care not to overbake.

**Ingredients:**

100g (4oz) butter softened

75g (3oz) caster sugar

1 egg separated

200g (7oz) plain flour

Grated rind of 1 lemon

50g (2oz) currants

1-2 tablespoons milk

Caster sugar for sprinkling

3 greased baking trays

Pre heated oven to 200degrees C/400degrees F/ Gas 6

**Method:** Cream together butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg yolk adding a little flour if necessary to prevent Curdling. Stir in flour and lemon rind. Add currants and enough milk to give a fairly soft dough. Knead mixture lightly to form a ball and roll out on a floured surface to ¼ inch (5mm) thick. Cut into rounds and place on baking trays. Bake for 8-10 mins. Remove from oven. Brush with lightly beaten egg white and sprinkle with caster sugar. Return to oven for another 4-5 mins. Remove when pale golden and lift onto cooling trays.

450g (1lb) raw beetroot peeled and grated

225g(8oz) red onion peeled and finely chopped

40g (1½oz) butter

75g ( 2 ½oz) granulated sugar

2 teasp peeled and grated fresh root ginger

30ml (1 fl oz) sherry vinegar

124ml (4 fl oz) red wine vinegar

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

**Method:** Heat butter in saucepan and add onion. Cook over a low heat until very soft. Do not brown. Add sugar and dissolve. Add all other ingredients and simmer gently uncovered for 30 mins. Season to taste. Pot in warmed jars and seal.
